

# Journalist Style Guide for Covering Immigration

### Tips & Guidelines for Reporting on Immigration:

- Place the humanity of immigrants at the center.
- Report from a multiracial perspective -- immigrants come to the U.S. from every country in the world, and most Latinos in the U.S. are not immigrants.
- Cover immigration as a civil issue, not a criminal one. Familiarize yourself with current policies and laws, and accurately report on immigration reform legislation.
  - Immigration laws are complex. Do not state as a fact that someone has violated the law without sufficient attribution.
  - Use "illegal" only to describe an action, not a person.
- Remember: there is no one word that can describe all situations of undocumented immigrants.
- Familiarize yourself with the range of categories describing a person's citizenship and immigration status: nationality, country of origin, citizen, permanent resident, undocumented/unauthorized.
- Do not specify a person's immigration status unless it is relevant to the story.
- Examine the ways immigration issues intersect with systems and institutions across society, such as child welfare and local law enforcement.
- Use terms that are legally accurate and avoid racially and politically charged labels.
